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Scope of Reporting

This Public Accountability Statement includes information from November 1, 2014, to October 31, 2015, for the following affiliates of Scotiabank in Canada: Scotia Capital Inc., The Mortgage Insurance Company of Canada, National Trust Company, Scotia Mortgage Corporation, Scotia General Insurance Company, Hollis Canadian Bank, Montreal Trust Company of Canada, Scotia Life Insurance Company, The Bank of Nova Scotia Trust Company, RoyNat Inc., and Scotia Merchant Capital Corporation. These affiliates are finance entities or financial institution subsidiaries of Scotiabank operating in Canada that have less than \$1 billion in equity with the exception of Scotia Capital Inc., which has equity in excess of \$1 billion.

Scotiabank is Canada's international bank and a leading financial services provider in North America, Latin America, the Caribbean and Central America, and parts of Asia. We are dedicated to helping our 23 million customers become better off through a broad range of advice, products and services, including personal and commercial banking, wealth management and private banking, corporate and investment banking, and capital markets. With a team of approximately 90,000 employees and assets of \$856 billion (as at October 31, 2015), Scotiabank trades on the Toronto (TSX:BNS) and New York (NYSE:BNS) exchanges.



CORPORATE DONATIONS AND PHILANTHROPIC ACTIVITY

Through our global philanthropic efforts, we bring together the passion of our employees, the insight of the Bank's community partners and the spirit of communities. Since the Bank's inception, Scotiabankers have been giving back to communities in order to create better places to live and work. Scotiabank's multinational platform provides a unique opportunity to help communities around the globe.

Community Investment

In fiscal 2015, Scotiabank contributed approximately CAD\$70 million in donations, sponsorships and other forms of assistance globally. Scotiabank employees across the Bank's global locations also contributed more than 575,000 hours of volunteering and fundraising time to local causes.



Looking ahead, the Bank will be bringing great focus to its community investment portfolio to provide greater impact and generate long-term social and economic growth in all the communities where it operates.

Employee Volunteer Programs

Scotiabank employees give extraordinary support to local causes. The Bank supports their efforts through two formal global employee community programs:

- 1. Scotiabank Team Community Program (STCP) matches funds raised by employee teams. Through STCP, the Bank matches up to CAD\$5,000 raised by teams of five or more employees or CAD\$15,000 raised by teams of 30 or more employees.
 - **Example:** Scotiabankers in our London, U.K. office accompanied by Scotiabank customers took part in the annual London to Paris bike ride in support of the Royal British Legion. The route covered 460 kilometres over four days and the team raised roughly CAD\$45,000.

- Scotiabank Employee Volunteer Program (SEVP) provides donations to community organizations where individual employees have been active volunteers. Individual employees or retirees who have actively volunteered for at least 50 hours a year with a qualifying community-based organization can apply for a donation of up to CAD\$1,000 from the Bank.
 - **Example:** Donna Molby is a Board member of the Sarah McLachlan School of Music who has volunteered more than 300 hours in the last year. The Sarah McLachlan School of Music provides afterschool music education at no cost to underserved and at-risk populations living in Vancouver, British Columbia. Students aged one to five, grades 4 through 12, and adults 55+ receive high-quality music instruction in both contemporary and classical traditions with no previous experience required. In 2016, the Sarah McLachlan School of Music will be expanding their programming to Surrey, British Columbia and Edmonton, Alberta.

In 2015, Scotiabank donated approximately CAD\$13 million to employee volunteer programs.

Philanthropic Activity

Below are examples of philanthropic support provided by Scotiabank in the following focus areas:

Arts and Culture

Support for the arts enriches the quality of life in the communities where we live and work. Scotiabank continues to support the arts and aims to bring them to life for people who might not otherwise have the opportunity to participate.

Scotiabank was pleased to partner with Crows Theatre on the Scotiabank Creative Communities Program. The program is focused on providing workshops for more than 700 young people in the east end of Toronto, Ontario. The workshops include acting, improv and song.

Education

Scotiabank's focus on education funding provides financial aid to students in recognition of their academic excellence and ensures that they can pursue their interests regardless of economic background. The Bank's efforts in providing student aid continued in 2015, awarding more than 450 scholarships and bursaries internationally, totalling \$1.2 million.

- Saint Mary's University received a commitment from Scotiabank to create a foundation that will help usher in a new era for technology start-ups with the introduction of the Master of Technology Entrepreneurship and Innovation (MTEI) program. The MTEI program will prepare the next generation of leaders for new technologies and transformative opportunities. The graduate program is positioned to close the gaps in existing business practices and educate students on cutting-edge technology.
- In 2015, Scotiabank was pleased to establish several new awards at **Thompson Rivers University** in Kamloops, British Columbia. The awards are available to students in the New Venture Creation program (Entrepreneurship) within the Bachelor of Business Administration and Post-Baccalaureate Diploma programs. In the New Venture Creation program, students learn to research new business ideas, prepare formal business plans, secure initial financing, and manage small businesses on an ongoing basis. When completed, students will have developed the entrepreneurial abilities and spirit that are critical in generating a dynamic economy that can compete globally.

Environment

Scotiabank continues to support the environmental initiatives of not-for-profit organizations and registered charities dedicated to environmental preservation, education and sustainability.

■ The **Trans Canada Trail** is one of the world's longest networks of trails. When completed, the Trail will stretch nearly 24,000 kilometres across Canada from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific Ocean to the Arctic Ocean. Scotiabank's commitment will go towards filling in gaps in the Trail between Dieppe, New Brunswick and the Confederation Bridge. The Trail will give Canadians opportunities to be active while exploring our diverse landscapes and appreciating our rich history.

Health

Helping to improve patient care and get patients back into society as quickly as possible remains a focus for Scotiabank's funding in the health care sector. The Bank is proud to partner with a variety of organizations supporting this cause.

Scotiabank was pleased to support the Independent Living Program (ILP) at the ErinoakKids Centre for Treatment and Development. The ILP helps young people make the transition from children's treatment centre care into adulthood. For 11 days and 10 nights, participants live in a barrier-free apartment in a university residence and learn the skills of independence – banking, using public transit, cooking and more.

Social Services

Providing strong support to the community is central to everything we do at Scotiabank.

• Welcome Hall Mission in Montreal offers specialized support for pregnant and young mothers in social and economic difficulty through its program Coeur à Soeur. Each year, approximately 200 to 250 young women aged 15 to 30 turn to the mission for help to break the cycle of poverty, homelessness and self-destructive lifestyles. Scotiabank was proud to support the program and help young women access affordable housing and vocational training opportunities to assist their transition back into society.

Sports

Scotiabank continues to support sports and promote sportsmanship and leadership, whether through youth-organized teams or formally organized sports teams and events.

Scotiabank was proud to support the Canadian Deaf Ice Hockey Federation team as they participated in the 18th Winter Deaflympics Games in Russia in March 2015. Over the seven-day tournament, the team participated in five games and won the silver medal. Our young Canadian team played extremely well and gained valuable experience at the international level, preparing them for future events.

SMALL BUSINESS BANKING

Scotiabank supports small business in Canada with over 1,700 branch-based Small Business advisors delivering practical tools, resources and banking services to help small businesses grow and succeed. In 2015, a number of new small business initiatives were launched:

A new business account that responds to changing business volumes:

Scotiabank's new Right Size Account for business responds to our customers' desire to have an account with fees that automatically adjust to changing business transaction volumes. This account only charges for transactions that are processed, and when volumes increase, the price per transaction goes down. Every dollar counts for a small business, and with the Right Size Account for business, the savings can add up, conserving cash and helping reduce monthly expenses.

Reducing the time it takes to open a new Small **Business Account:**

By consolidating and reducing the number of documents, signatures and input screens required when a customer visits a branch to open a new business account, Scotiabank has significantly reduced the time necessary to open a Small Business Account. By reducing the administrative process, our Small Business advisors have more time to focus on providing advice and resources that will help the small business owner achieve their objectives.

Even stronger support for start-up businesses:

For the past five years Scotiabank has been a leader in providing financial services to start-ups, offering its unique Running Start for business program tailored to the needs of businesses two years and younger. This year the Bank welcomed the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) as a new partner to the program. Running Start for business customers are now offered the benefits of CFIB's member services team, the strength of its advocacy programs, and a package of discounts on a variety of business services through its Partner Benefit Program. This is in addition to the lending and business account discounts already offered on Scotiabank products, Chase Paymentech's merchant services rebate program, Davis and Henderson's design cheque services and the offer of one free year of access to Intuit's QuickBooks Online accounting software.

Increasing our support to professionals:

In 2015, Scotiabank expanded its network of qualified professional specialists, bringing incremental expertise and specialization to health care and other professionals. Working with the highly successful Scotia Professional Plan, these specialists are supported by unique lending, cash management and investment products customized to their specific requirements.

New lending options for agricultural enterprises:

In 2015, Small Business increased its lending capabilities to agricultural enterprises, now accommodating larger loans and offering innovative lending approaches through enhancements to Scotiabank's universal credit limit product called Scotia Flex for agriculture. These changes now give small business advisors new options to support the unique needs of agricultural enterprises.

Scotiabank Prepaid Reloadable Visa cards are alternative payment cards that are loaded and reloaded with the customer's own funds and can be used anywhere Visa is accepted. These cards provide a credit-free way for holders to pay for purchases worldwide and online without qualifying for credit.

The ScotiaCard with Visa Debit allows customers to pay with their debit card online and internationally wherever Visa is accepted. ScotiaCard with Visa Debit is a debit card not a credit card. Any purchases or transactions customers make with a ScotiaCard with Visa Debit will be debited directly from their chequing account.

Scotiabank's Basic Banking Account (Canada) is a low-cost bank account designed for customers who keep their monthly transactions to a minimum.

Beneficiaries of a Registered Disability Savings Plan are eligible to have their Basic Banking Account monthly fee waived.

Customers over 60 years of age, through our seniors discount program, enjoy the Basic Banking Account with no monthly fee.

Bank the Rest Savings Program (Canada) helps customers improve their saving habits while making everyday debit purchases.

The Momentum Savings Account pays customers twice – first with an everyday competitive interest rate, and then with extra interest when customers keep their money saved.

The Scotiabank Savings Accelerator Account offers customers a registered and non-registered option and a high interest rate on their entire balance as it grows.

Scotiabank Canada offers a variety of credit products, from no-fee to low-rate to rewards, to meet customer needs.

Getting There Savings Program for Youth (Canada) is a no-fee account with unlimited debit transactions for children under 19 years of age.

Savings, Investment and Credit Products

Scotiabank offers students an opportunity to build credit for the future using the L'earn Visa card or Student SCENE Visa card, with no minimum income requirement.

L'earn® Visa* card is a no annual fee card that offers students Moneyback rewards.

The no annual fee Student SCENE Visa card allows students to earn SCENE rewards points to redeem towards movies, entertainment and more.

ScotiaLine Personal Line of Credit for Students is an interest-only line of credit for students to help pay for tuition and related expenses and also provide an interest-only grace period for 12 months following graduation.

To make it easier for student customers to do business with Scotiabank, technology initiatives were piloted at 14 of the top student-focused branches in Canada. Branch advisors were provided with equipment to enable end-to-end fulfillment of bank accounts and credit cards, all on-campus during the busy back-to-school season, allowing for customer on-boarding with no branch visit.

Newcomers to Canada



Landed immigrants and foreign workers receive \$100 when they open an eligible chequing account. They can secure their valuables with a free safety deposit box for one year and can purchase gold and other precious metals through services provided by ScotiaMocatta®.

Landed immigrants and foreign workers can build their credit history with an unsecured credit card, and get a Scotia U.S. Dollar Daily Interest Account or a Scotia Euro Daily Interest Savings Account. They may take advantage of a number of Scotiabank StartRight programs.

International students in Canada can get an unsecured SCENE Visa card or an unsecured L'earn Visa card with great rewards and no annual fee. They can open a Scotia U.S. Dollar Daily Interest Account or a Scotia Euro Daily Interest Savings Account.

PHYSICAL ACCESS TO BANKING

The Bank makes significant efforts to accommodate the needs of people with disabilities. Since 2003, all new and renovated Scotiabank branches and facilities in Canada meet or exceed the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) accessibility guidelines. The Bank is targeting 100% accessibility in all public areas of our existing Canadian branches. Accessibility in fiscal 2015 is above 95%.

Scotiabank ABMs are designed for easy accessibility:

- They have a minimum standard height for the card reader, keypad, passbook printer, screen and transaction receipt slot to provide better access for customers in wheelchairs.
- ABMs in most branches have features such as grab bars to assist persons with mobility impairments, and audio navigation as well as contrasting colour and screen LED lights to help direct customers to the transaction they have chosen.
- ABMs are consistent with CSA Guidelines (B651.1)
 "Accessible design for automated banking machines," including audio navigation for customers with visual impairments.

TAXES

Scotiabank incurs a number of taxes including direct taxes on income by Canadian federal and provincial governments and the governments of foreign jurisdictions in which the Bank operates; as well as several indirect taxes. In 2015, this totalled \$2.9 billion, representing 28% of the Bank's net income before income, capital and other taxes for the year.
