The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with IFRS Accounting Standards.

Investment Objective and Strategies

The Fund's investment objective is to provide regular income and long-term capital growth. It invests primarily in a diversified portfolio of fixed income and income-oriented equity securities.

The Fund uses a flexible approach to investing primarily in fixed income and income-oriented equity securities with no restrictions on market capitalization, industry sector or geographic mix. The Fund's asset mix will vary according to the portfolio adviser's view of market and economic conditions.

The Fund may invest in fixed income securities of any quality or term. This includes, but is not limited to, government and corporate bonds, convertible bonds and debentures. This may include securities that are unrated or have a credit rating below investment grade. The term to maturity of these securities will vary depending on the portfolio adviser's outlook on interest rates.

To the extent that the Fund invests in equity securities, these may include common shares, preferred shares, convertible preferred shares, real estate investment trusts, and other high yielding equity securities that are diversified by sector, style and geography.

When buying and selling securities, the portfolio adviser will:

- analyze the financial and managerial prospects for a particular company and its relevant sector

- assess the condition of credit markets and the yield curve, including the outlook on monetary conditions
- conduct management interviews with companies to determine the corporate strategy and business plan, as well as to evaluate management capabilities.

The Fund may also hold mortgage-backed securities, participation interests in loans, notes, closed end funds and private placements in equity and/or debt securities of public or private companies.

The Fund can invest up to 100% of its assets in foreign securities.

Risk

The risks associated with investing in the Fund are as described in the simplified prospectus. There were no material changes to the Fund over its last completed financial year that affected the overall level of risk of the Fund.

Results of Operations

For the year ended at December 31, 2024 (the “period”), the Series A units of the Fund generated a total return of 11.5%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund’s benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the “Past Performance” section for the performance of the Fund’s other series.

The Fund’s broad-based benchmarks, the S&P/TSX Composite Index and the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index returned 21.6% and returned 4.2%, respectively, during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to broad-based indices to help you understand the Fund’s performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund’s mandate may be significantly different from the indices shown.

The Fund’s blended benchmark, 50% S&P/TSX Composite Index and 50% FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index returned 12.7% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

The Fund underperformed the blended benchmark due in part to security selection and an underweight in Information Technology and an overweight in the Communications Services and Real Estate sectors.

The Canadian equity market ended the 12-month period in positive territory. The period saw the Bank of Canada (BoC) become the first Group of Seven central bank to cut interest rates. The BoC aggressively cut rates 5 times, with the last two cuts being a jumbo cut –50 basis points. Interest rates declined from 5.00% to 3.25%.

The period witnessed equity markets generating double digits returns, while GDP growth averaged nearly 2.0% growth for the first three quarters of 2024, on an annualized basis. By year-end, inflation has reached the central bank’s target rate of 2%, it fell from 2.9% to 1.9% in November. The drop in rates in the second half of 2024 saw a surge in housing starts rising 8.4% month-over-month in November, the highest level in four months. Though, the manufacturing sector remains a sore spot as it contracted again in October, marking its 11th straight monthly contraction. The sector continued to be hindered by weak new orders and output.

Moving forward, BoC Governor Macklem said ‘the central bank isn’t expecting a recession, though growth is slower than it had forecast.’ He also said there was heightened uncertainty with the possibility that the incoming U.S. administration will follow through with threatened tariffs on Canadian exports.

Ten of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month period. The best performing sectors were Information Technology, Financials and Energy. The worst performing sectors were Communication Services, Real Estate and Health Care. Over the period, the Canadian dollar weakened against most major currencies, except the Japanese yen.

The U.S. equity market ended the 12-month period in positive territory as the S&P 500 Index (C\$) returned 36.1%. The period witnessed equity markets generate double-digits returns as the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) cut interest rates three times reducing the Federal Funds rate from 5.5% to 4.5%.

The economy expanded in the first three quarters of the period; this was boosted by a surge in consumer spending. What is noteworthy, inflation declined in the third quarter – from 2.9% to 2.4% – but crept back up to 2.7% in November.

Labor markets remain in a delicate equilibrium. Hiring rates are low, but so are layoffs. Income growth has supported strong consumption and Fed officials have been looking for signs that job growth is settling out at a pace that can hold the unemployment rate steady.

The Fed is trying to pull off a balancing act. They want to prevent the aggressive rate increases of the past two years from unnecessarily slowing down economic activity, but they don’t want to undo recent progress on inflation. Fed officials expect inflation to be stickier next year than anticipated.

All 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the 12-month period. The best performing sectors were Communication Services, Information Technology and Financials. The worst performing sectors were Materials, Health Care and Real Estate. Over the period, the U.S. dollar strengthened against all major currencies.

The Canadian bond market, as represented by the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, finished up for the 12-month period. The 10-year Government of Canada yield peaked in April before dipping down to 2.87% in September and rising into the year-end to finish at 3.22% for the period. The Bank of Canada (BoC) became the first of the G7 countries to begin easing as they announced a 25 basis points (bps) cut in early June; this was the first rate cut by

the BoC in four years and was followed by four more cuts during the year. Within the U.S., the 10-year Treasury yield similarly trended upwards into the spring then fell to 3.62% in September. Following Trump's election victory, bond markets experienced a volatile sell-off driven largely by the anticipation of inflationary policies and bigger deficits under the new administration, leading to a rise in U.S. Treasury yields and they finished the period at 4.58%. The Federal Reserve began its own easing policy with a 50 bps cut in September, the first cut since emergency easing ended during the pandemic. They then followed with a 25 bps cut in both November and December.

Investment grade and high yield credit spreads, as measured by ICE BofA Canadian and U.S. corporate indices OAS (Option-Adjusted Spread) narrowed for the first half of the period before widening dramatically in August. Spreads then narrowed into the 4th quarter, reaching period tights.

The Fund remained overweight in equities and underweight in fixed income during the period. The allocation to equities, fixed income and cash was relatively unchanged. Geographically, the Fund maintained its North American focus, with Canada increasing while the U.S. was maintained. Both regions were contributors to returns, with the U.S. having the greater impact. Partial currency hedging undertaken was also a detractor to performance.

The equity allocation is diversified with the largest sector weightings in Financials, Energy (which includes Energy Infrastructure) and Industrials. Overall, most sector exposures were modestly changed, though increases were made to Financials, Industrials and Energy Infrastructure as Communication Services, Real Estate and Health Care were lowered. Within fixed income, there were no notable changes across the positions.

On a sector level among equities, Financials, Energy and Information Technology were the top contributors to performance with Communication Services a detractor. Fixed income had a beneficial impact, primarily through holdings in the 1832 AM U.S. \$ Investment Grade U.S. Corporate Bond Pool and Dynamic Short Term Credit PLUS Fund. Within equities, top security contributors included Apollo Global Management, Inc. and Royal Bank of Canada while Rogers Communications, Inc. and TELUS Corporation were detractors.

The Fund's net asset value increased to \$185.1 million at December 31, 2024, from \$171.1 million at December 31, 2023. This change was composed of net redemptions of \$4.0 million, and investment performance of \$19.0 million and cash distributions of \$1.0 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the

Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Recent Developments

There have been no recent developments that have affected, or are likely to materially affect the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses ("Fund Costs"). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series' expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Distribution Services

Certain registered dealers through which units of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The

Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager, during the period, could also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, custody, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the "IRC") in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds ("NI 81-107") with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager's decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has five members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Heather A. T. Hunter, Cecilia Mo and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager's website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus

expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are split equally among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and
- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

The breakdown of services received in consideration of management fees for each series, as a percentage of the management fees, are as follows:

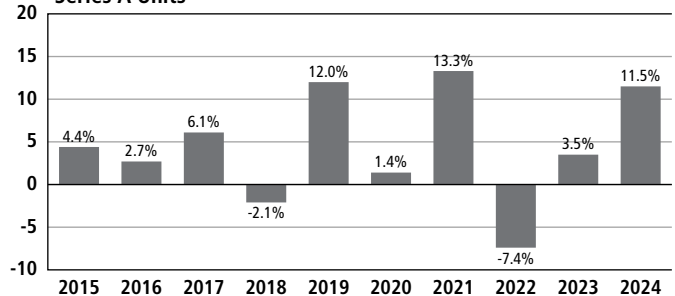
Past Performance

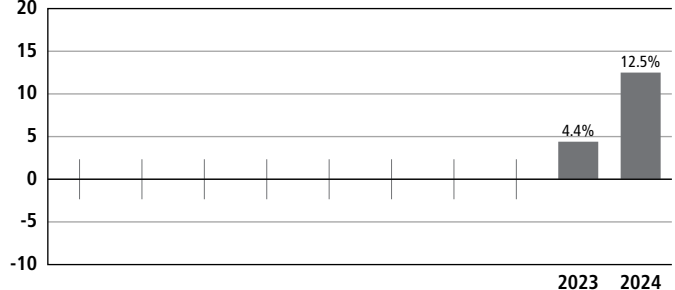
Year-by-Year Returns

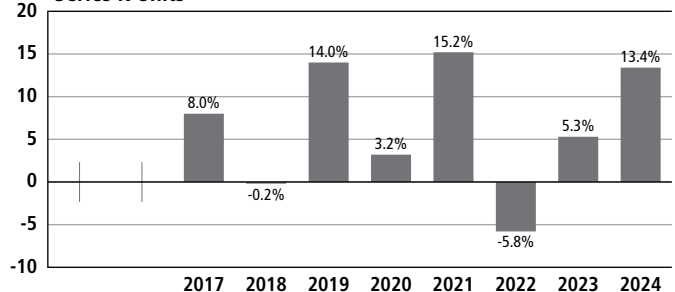
% Series A Units

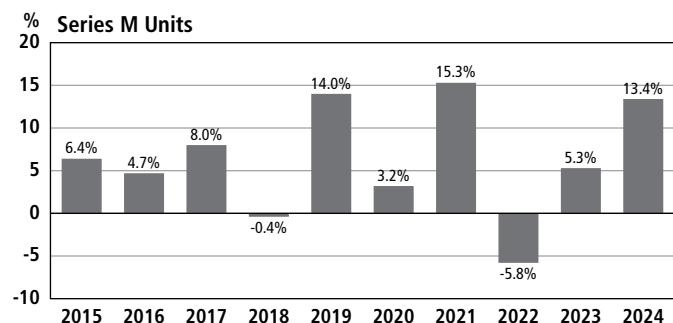


% Series F Units
