The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 - Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

Results of Operations

For the six month period ended at December 31, 2022 (the "period"), the Series A units of the Fund generated a total return of 2.2%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund's benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the "Past Performance" section for the performance of the Fund's other series.

The Fund's broad-based benchmarks, the S&P/TSX Composite Index and the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, returned 4.5% and 0.6%, respectively, during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to broad-based indices to help you understand the Fund's performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund's mandate may be significantly different from the indices shown.

The Fund's blended benchmark, 20% FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, 25% S&P/TSX Composite Index and 55% Solactive GBS

Developed Markets Large & Mid Cap Index (C\$), returned 5.8% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

To achieve its long term asset allocation mandate, the Fund invested directly in fund(s) managed by the Manager or by third party investment managers ("Underlying Fund(s)"). As a result, the following commentary on investment portfolio activity relates to the Underlying Fund(s). Commentary on income, expenses and shareholder activity relate to the Fund.

The Fund has a long-term asset allocation of 80% equities and 20% bonds. During the period, the Fund underperformed its blended benchmark as a result of its global equity component underperforming its respective benchmark.

Global equities ended the six month period in positive territory as the MSCI World Index (C\$) returned 8.3%. Along with the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent variants, inflation levels not seen since the 1970s and a continuing war between Russia and Ukraine were the main headwinds facing the global economy over this period.

The dominant story of the second half of the year was the unprecedented levels of inflation seen around the world and the response by the world's monetary authorities to curb prices and bring inflation levels to within target ranges. Inflation became an even larger story than COVID-19 as the year progressed. Surging consumer prices pushed the global inflation rate beyond 11%, weighing heavily on households' purchasing power and sentiment. The inflationary backdrop was exacerbated by Russia's invasion of Ukraine which added complexity to already disrupted supply lines and placed more upward pressure on commodity prices.

The burgeoning inflation problem forced the world's monetary authorities to place their policy set interest rates on a trajectory that seemed to echo that last seen during the 1970s. In the U.S., the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) raised interest rates four times and saw the Federal Funds Rate jump from 0.88% to 4.33% by year-end. By year-end, with several months of tighter financial conditions, investor concerns started to shift from rising inflation and interest rates towards weakening economic and corporate earnings growth.

Nine of the 11 MSCI World Index (C\$) GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the six month period. The best performing sectors were Energy, Industrials, and Financials. The worst performing sectors were Communications Services, Real Estate and Consumer Discretionary.

Within the Fund's global equity component, Dynamic Power Global Growth Class generated a negative return, underperforming the MSCI World Index and detracting from performance. Three additional holdings — Dynamic Global Infrastructure Fund, Dynamic Global Dividend Fund and Dynamic Global Equity Income Fund — had positive returns but underperformed the index and detracted from performance. Dynamic Global Equity Fund was the only global equity holding to outperform the index and contribute to performance. The combined weighted average of the Fund's global equity holdings underperformed the index as a result.

The Canadian equity market ended the six month period in positive territory as the S&P/TSX Composite Index returned 4.5%. The second half of 2022 saw a rebound as capital markets and the central bank continued its aggressive move in combating inflation.

At the end of June, we witnessed inflation peak to an almost 40-year high reaching 8.1%. This coincided with oil prices topping to \$123 per barrel in June. The last time oil surpassed \$120 per barrel was in 2008. During this period, the Bank of Canada (BoC) raised interest rates four times and saw the target overnight rate jump from 1.50% to 4.25% by year-end. This has had a positive impact on inflation and as it fell below 7%. Though, it has not reached the BoC's target inflation rate of 2%, it is moving in the right direction.

Against this backdrop, the Canadian economy has shown its resiliency as it has avoided dipping into negative growth territory. For the third quarter, the economy grew at 2.9% on an annualized basis. Higher commodity prices, increased business investment and pent-up demand following the end of COVID-19 restrictions has supported the economy.

Eight of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted positive returns over the six month period. The best performing sectors were Consumer Discretionary (+13.4%), Industrials (+11.9%), and Consumer Staples (+11.3%). The worst performing sectors were Health Care (-16.6%), Utilities (-11.7%), and Communication Services (-4.3%).

Over the period, the Canadian dollar weakened against most major currencies including the Euro currency, British pound, Japanese yen and the U.S. dollar.

The Fund's five Canadian equity holdings all generated positive returns. However, Dynamic Dividend Fund and Dynamic Small Business Fund underperformed the S&P/TSX Composite Index and detracted from performance, while Dynamic Value Fund of Canada performed in line with the index. The Fund's remaining Canadian equity holdings, Dynamic Power Small Cap Fund and Dynamic Power Canadian Growth Fund, outperformed the index and contributed to performance. Overall, the combined weighted average of the Fund's Canadian equity holdings performed in line with the index.

The Canadian bond market, as represented by the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, was volatile but finished relatively flat (up 0.6%) for the six month period ending December 31, 2022, as central banks around the world continued to grapple with inflation concerns, risks of a recession and a geopolitical crisis in Europe. The 10-year Government of Canada yield was very volatile during the period but finished the period basically flat at 3.3%. Inflation indicators did not begin rolling over until the end of the year as the Bank of Canada raised its policy interest rate four times: a historic 100 basis points hike in July, a 75 basis points hike in September, followed by two 50 basis points hikes before the end of the year.

Within the U.S., the 10-year Treasury yield trended upwards at first, peaking at 4.3% in October before trending downwards and then moving slightly higher to finish the year at 3.9%. The Federal Reserve continued it's battle against inflation and raised rates

four times in the period, three 75 basis points hikes in July, September and November followed by a 50 basis points hike in December.

Investment grade and high yield credit spreads, as measured by ICE BofA Canadian and U.S. corporate indices OAS (Option-Adjusted Spread) rallied through the summer, rose higher in September/October before falling once again into the end of the year reflecting some optimism about the health of bond issuers and the economy.

Within the Fund's fixed income component, Dynamic Credit Spectrum Fund and Dynamic High Yield Bond Fund outperformed the FTSE Canadian Universe Bond Index and contributed to performance. The Fund's remaining fixed income holdings, Dynamic Total Return Bond Fund, Dynamic Canadian Bond Fund and Dynamic Corporate Bond Strategies Fund, performed in line with the index. As a result, the combined weighted average of the Fund's fixed income holdings outperformed the index.

The Fund's net asset value increased to \$702.2 million at December 31, 2022, from \$681.4 million at June 30, 2022. This change was composed of investment performance of \$16.5 million, net sales of \$4.7 million and cash distributions of \$0.4 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager

a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly.

Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses ("Fund Costs"). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series' expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

Distribution Services

Certain registered dealers through which units of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager, during the period, could also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

Other Fees

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

Independent Review Committee

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the "IRC") in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 — Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds ("NI 81-107") with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager's decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject

to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has five members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Simon Hitzig, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager's website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are allocated among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee in a manner that is considered by the Manager to be fair and reasonable. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Prior to November 1, 2021, each IRC member also received a fee for each committee meeting attended. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

 Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;

- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and
- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, did not rely on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

Financial Highlights

Management Fee

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and calculated and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.
