1832 Asset Management L.P. is the manager (the "Manager") of the fund. In this document, "we", "us", "our" and the "Manager" refer to 1832 Asset Management L.P. and the "Fund" refers to Scotia Partners Growth Portfolio.

The term "net asset value" or "net asset value per unit" in this document refers to the net asset value determined in accordance with Part 14 of National Instrument 81-106 – Investment Fund Continuous Disclosure ("National Instrument 81-106"); while the term "net assets" or "net assets per unit" refers to total equity or net assets attributable to unitholders of the Fund as determined in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

#### Results of Operations

For the six month period ended June 30, 2022 (the "period"), the Series A units of the Fund generated a total return of – 17.3%. Fund returns are reported net of all management fees and expenses for all series, unlike the returns of the Fund's benchmark, which is based on the performance of an index that does not pay fees or incur expenses. Returns for other series of the Fund will be similar to Series A with any difference in performance being primarily due to different management fees, operating expenses and other expenses that are applicable to that particular series. Please see the "Past Performance" section for the performance of the Fund's other series.

To achieve its long term asset allocation mandate, the Fund invested directly in fund(s) managed by the Manager or by third party investment managers ("Underlying Fund(s)"). As a result the following commentary on investment portfolio activity relates to the Underlying Fund(s). Commentary on income, expenses and unitholder activity relate to the Fund.

The Fund's broad-based benchmarks, the Solactive GBS Developed Markets Large & Mid Cap Index (C\$) and the S&P/TSX Composite Index, returned – 19.2% and returned – 9.9%, respectively, during the same period. In accordance with National Instrument 81-106, we have included a comparison to broad-based indices to help you

understand the Fund's performance relative to the general performance of the market, but caution that the Fund's mandate may be significantly different from the indices shown.

The Fund's blended benchmark, 30% S&P/TSX Composite Index, 25% FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index and 45% Solactive GBS Developed Markets Large & Mid Cap Index (C\$), returned – 14.7% during the same period. We have included this comparison, which more closely reflects the market sectors and/or asset classes in which the Fund invests, to provide a more useful comparative to the performance of the Fund.

The Fund has a long-term asset allocation of 75% equities and 25% bonds. During the period, the Fund underperformed its blended benchmark as a result of its global and Canadian equity components underperforming their respective benchmarks.

The global equity market ended the 6-month period in negative territory as the MSCI World Index (\$C) returned – 18.6%. The first half of 2022 can be summed up in one word: volatility. The Russia-Ukraine military conflict caused a global shock in capital markets with equities declining and bond yields rising. Commodity prices soared given Russia is a key producer of several important commodities including oil, gas, and wheat. This contributed to a further surge in inflation as well as supply chain disruption.

The year began with another Covid-19 wave in the form of the Omicron variant. Yet the negative impact from renewed mobility restrictions on economic growth in most parts of the world were milder than those seen for previous waves, partly in response to the widespread take up in vaccines. The same could not be said about China given its zero-Covid policy. Their imposed lockdowns, in tandem with regulatory restrictions imposed on a wide range of industries, generated an air pocket in growth which then spilled out to the rest of the world.

Inflation became an even larger story than Covid as the calendar year progressed. Surging consumer prices pushed the global inflation rate beyond 11%, weighing heavily on households' purchasing power and sentiment. The inflationary backdrop was exacerbated by Russia's invasion of Ukraine which added complexity to already disrupted supply lines and placed more upward pressure on commodity prices.

Some of the unintended consequences of reopening the economy resulted in supply chain issues, labor shortage and higher inflation. Inflation, as measured by the U.S. consumer price index, reached 8.6% annually in May 2022, a level not seen in four decades. The rise in inflation was initially seen by the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) as transitory, caused primarily by supply-chain bottlenecks and would eventually ease on their own. However, near the end of the year, Fed officials had much less conviction about that forecast and raised concerns about the potential for stronger demand pushing up prices – such as wages and rents – even after supply-chain bottlenecks abate. Thus, the call for raising short-term rates can happen in early 2022 as Fed Chairman Powell stated that inflation may be more persistent and 'the risk of higher inflation becoming entrenched has increased.'

All but one of the eleven MSCI World Index (C\$) GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted negative returns

over the 6-month period, with Energy being the exception. The best performing sectors were Energy, Utilities, and Health Care. The worst performing sectors were Consumer Discretionary, Information Technology, and Communication Services.

In the Fund's global equity component, four holdings, including Mackenzie Global Dividend Fund, outperformed the MSCI World Index and contributed performance. In addition, Mawer U.S. Equity Fund performed in line with the index. The Fund's five remaining global equity holdings, including Scotia Global Growth Fund, underperformed the index and detracted from performance. In general, dividend-focused equity strategies performed well on a relative basis, while growth-focused strategies faced challenges. The combined weighted average of the Fund's global equity holdings underperformed the index as a result.

The Canadian equity market ended the 6-month period in negative territory as the S&P/TSX Composite Index returned – 9.9%. The first half of 2022 can be summed up in one word: volatility. As we began lifting Covid-19 lockdown restrictions and reopening the economy, we witnessed major global supply chain issues causing rapid inflation. This was further compounded by the Russia-Ukraine military conflict. The reaction to these events was one of severity in the capital markets.

The effects associated with reopening the economy resulted in greater demand of goods, rising commodity prices, higher input costs, supply chain disruptions, and lifting inflation to its highest point in almost 40 years. In May, inflation reached 7.7% on an annualized basis. Energy prices have soared: oil prices increased by 350% from April 2020 to April 2022, the largest increase for any two-year period since the early 1970s. Furthermore, coal and natural gas prices reached historical highs.

As a counterpoint, the Bank of Canada (BoC) aggressively increased interest rates three times since March. The overnight loan rate, its key interest rate, has risen from 0.25% in March to 1.50% at the end of the first half of the year. More rate hikes are expected in the second half, as the BoC has stated its main goal is to tame inflation and stop it before becoming entrenched in the economy.

To contend with these challenges, many companies plan to increase spending on equipment to improve productivity, and hiring intentions also remain widespread. The BoC's Business Outlook Survey showed firms remain optimistic about future sales growth, but an increasing number of businesses expect growth to decelerate over the next 12 months as demand normalizes.

Nine of the 11 GICS (Global Industry Classification Standard) sectors posted negative returns over the 6-month period. The best performing sectors were Energy (+26.2%), Utilities (+1.3%), and Communication Services (– 0.8%). The worst performing sectors were Information Technology (– 55.3%), Health Care (– 53.9%), and Real Estate (– 21.7%).

Over the period, the Canadian dollar strengthened against most major currencies, save the U.S. dollar.

Among the Fund's six Canadian equity holdings, Dynamic Value Fund of Canada and Scotia Canadian Dividend Fund outperformed

the S&P/TSX Composite Index and contributed to performance. The Fund's remaining four holdings, Scotia Canadian Growth Fund, Mackenzie Canadian Growth Fund, Dynamic Small Business Fund and 1832 AM Fundamental Canadian Equity Pool, underperformed the index and detracted from performance. As a result, the combined weighted average of the Fund's Canadian equity holdings underperformed the index.

The Canadian bond market, as represented by the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index, fell 12.2% for the 6-month period ending June 30, 2022 as central banks around the world grappled with growing inflation concerns, pandemic-related supply chain issues and geopolitical crises in Europe. The 10-year Government of Canada yield moved significantly higher during the period, reaching 3.6% in June before finishing the period at 3.2%. With inflation indicators flashing red early in 2022, the Bank of Canada embarked on its most aggressive tightening schedule in years, raising its policy interest rate by 25 basis points in March followed by 50 basis points both in April and June.

Within the U.S., the 10-year treasury yield similarly reached pre-pandemic highs, peaking at 3.5% in June before rallying to 3.0% to finish the period. Seemingly caught off guard by spiking inflation numbers, the Federal Reserve raised rates three times in 2022. March saw a 25 basis points hike, followed by 50 basis points in May before a 75 basis points rate hike in June which was the biggest increase since 1994 as inflation numbers reached 40 year highs.

Investment grade and high yield credit spreads, as measured by ICE BofA Canadian and U.S. corporate indices OAS (Option-Adjusted Spread), rose higher during the period, widening materially in February as Russia launched an invasion of Ukraine. A brief rally in risk markets in March and the end of May saw spreads compress, before widening further into the end of the period.

Within the Fund's fixed income component, the performance of credit-focused strategies deviated widely. Scotia Wealth Canadian Corporate Bond Pool, together with Scotia Canadian Income Fund, outperformed the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index and contributed to performance. Conversely, Scotia Wealth High Yield Bond Pool was the only holding to underperform the index and detract from performance. The Fund's three remaining fixed income holdings, Dynamic Total Return Bond Fund, Dynamic Canadian Bond Fund and 1832 AM Global Credit Pool, performed in line with the index. Overall, however, the combined weighted average of the Fund's fixed income holdings outperformed the index.

The Fund's net asset value decreased to \$3,093.1 million at June 30, 2022, from \$3,869.8 million at December 31, 2021. This change was composed of cash distributions of \$0.1 million, net redemptions of \$117.4 million and investment performance of negative \$659.2 million. The investment performance of the Fund includes income and expenses which vary year over year. The Fund's income and expenses changed compared to the previous year mainly as a result of fluctuations in average net assets, portfolio activity and changes in the Fund's income earning investments.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the Manager from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The Manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

## Recent Developments

There have been no recent developments that have affected, or are likely to materially affect the Fund.

## Related Party Transactions

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia ("Scotiabank"). Scotiabank also owns, directly or indirectly, 100% of Scotia Securities Inc., a mutual fund dealer, and Scotia Capital Inc. (which includes ScotiaMcLeod and Scotia iTRADE), an investment dealer.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

The purpose of this section is to provide a brief description of any transaction involving the Fund and a related party.

## Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the Fund. Certain series of the Fund pay the Manager a management fee for its services as described in the "Management Fee" section later in this document. The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and paid monthly.

## Fixed Administration Fees and Fund Costs

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund, other than Fund Costs, in exchange for the payment by the Fund of a fixed rate administration fee (the "Fixed Administration Fee") to the Manager with respect to each series of the Fund. The expenses charged to the Fund in respect of the Fixed Administration Fee are disclosed in the Fund's financial statements. The Fixed Administration Fee is equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of a series, calculated and paid in the same manner as the management fees for the Fund. Further details about the Fixed Administration Fee can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

In addition, each series of the Fund is responsible for its proportionate share of certain operating expenses ("Fund Costs"). Further details about Fund Costs can be found in the Fund's most recent simplified prospectus.

The Manager, at its sole discretion, may waive or absorb a portion of a series' expenses. These waivers or absorptions may be terminated at any time without notice.

#### **Custodial Services**

Scotiabank, as the custodian of the Fund, earns a fee for providing custody and related services. The custodian holds the cash and investments of the Fund in safekeeping to ensure that they are used only for the benefit of the investors of the Fund. The custodian fee is paid by the Manager, in exchange for the Fixed Administration Fee received from the Fund.

The Fund has received approval from the Independent Review Committee to invest the Fund's overnight cash with Scotiabank with interest paid by Scotiabank to the Fund, based on prevailing market rates.

#### **Distribution Services**

Certain registered dealers through which units of the Fund are distributed are related parties to the Fund and the Manager. The Manager may pay a trailing commission, which is negotiated with dealers, to dealers for their financial advisors in respect of the assets of their clients invested in securities of the Fund. The Manager, during the period, could also pay trailing commissions to dealers for securities purchased or held through discount brokerage accounts.

#### **Other Fees**

The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn fees and spreads in connection with various services provided to, or transactions with, the Fund, such as banking, custody, brokerage, foreign exchange or derivatives transactions. The Manager, or its affiliates, may earn a foreign exchange spread when unitholders switch between series of funds denominated in different currencies.

#### **Independent Review Committee**

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the "IRC") in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds ("NI 81-107") with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager's decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds, and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has five members, Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Steven Donald, Simon Hitzig, Heather A. T. Hunter and Jennifer L. Witterick, each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager's website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. Each member of the IRC receives an annual retainer of \$62,000 (\$77,000 for the Chair), plus expenses for each meeting. The fees and expenses, plus associated legal costs, are allocated among all of the funds managed by the Manager for which the IRC acts as the independent review committee in a manner that is considered by the Manager to be fair and reasonable. The main component of compensation is an annual retainer fee. Prior to November 1, 2021, each IRC member also received a fee for each committee meeting attended. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, received the following standing instructions from the IRC with respect to related party transactions:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an agency and principal basis on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases or sales of securities of an issuer from or to another investment fund managed by the Manager;
- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Executing foreign exchange transactions with a related party on behalf of the Fund;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Entering into over-the-counter derivatives on behalf of the Fund with a related party;
- Outsourcing products and services to related parties which can be charged to the Fund;
- Acquisition of prohibited securities as defined by securities regulations;
- Trading in mortgages with a related party;
- Entering into a designated broker agreement with a related party; and
- Entering into a prime broker agreement with a related party.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of the standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best

interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager's written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of the Fund, did not rely on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions during the period.

## Management Fees

The management fee is an annualized rate based on the net asset value of each series of the Fund, accrued daily and paid monthly. The management fees cover the costs of managing the Fund, arranging for investment analysis, recommendations and investment decision making for the Fund, arranging for distribution of the Fund, marketing and promotion of the Fund and providing or arranging for other services.

The breakdown of services received in consideration of management fees for each series, as a percentage of the management fees, are as follows:

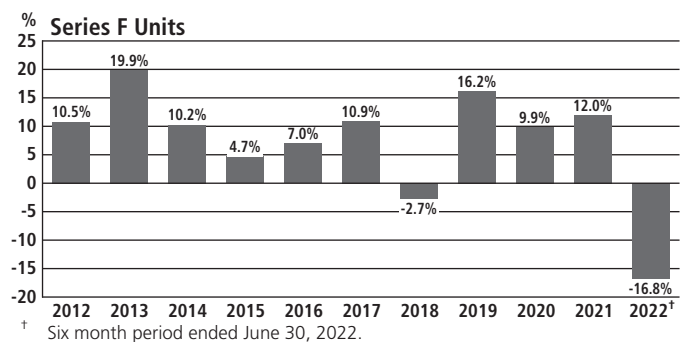
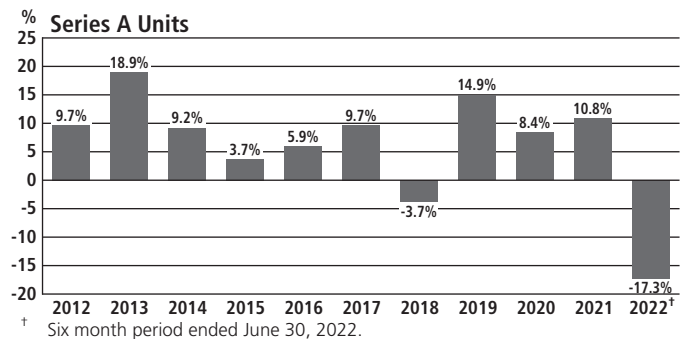
## Past Performance

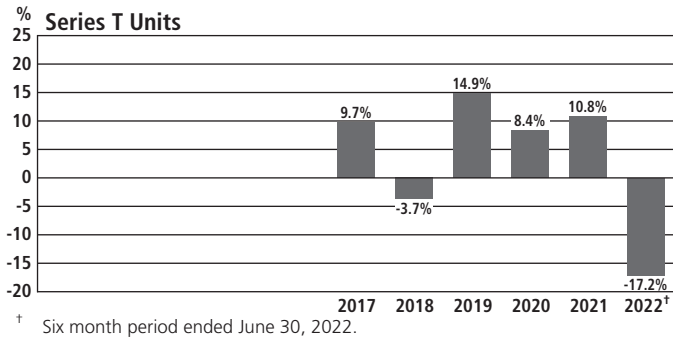
